Are drivers making safe tire choices for winter driving?

A Kal Tire winter driving survey confirms Canadians have concerning misperceptions about which tires are safe for winter use. The survey polled 1,664 motorists from BC to Ontario and found that while many drivers experience severe winter conditions, their tire choices could be putting themselves and others on the road at risk.

of Canadian drivers encounter severe winter driving conditions at least occasionally





How many drivers plan on using winter-designated tires?

Even in the three Prairie provinces that see extreme winter conditions most of the season, it's not a strong majority of drivers that plan on using winter-designated tires.




The only safe tire choices in winter

The survey showed that Canadians face a variety of winter driving conditions, all of which require a winter-designated tire. When temperatures fall below +7C, an all-weather or winter tire is the safe choice for drivers.
